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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Maharaja Ranjit Singh, the Lion of Punjab was proclaimed as Maharaja of Punjab in 1801. A great warrior; democrat, philanthropist and patriot, he integrated the MISLS (small states) into a secular powerful Punjab. Although a crowned king, he refused to wear the emblem of royalty and sit on the throne. The coins did not bear his name or image. The 'Will of people' was given great regard. Hindus, Sikhs and Muslims were equal before law and had equal rights.

Maharaja, as a real democrat helped educational and religious institutions of all communities. He never neglected the code of ethics even in the time of trouble of war.

To perpetuate the memory and ideals of this Great Son of India, Maharaja Ranjit Singh College of Professional Sciences was established in 1994 by the Indo Friends' Foundation Trust, Indore, which is a voluntary, non-political, non-profit making organization registered with the Government of M.P. as a public trust. Inspired by the great patriot Maharaja Ranjit Singh and his immense love for education, the foundation named the Institute as "Maharaja Ranjit Singh College of Professional Sciences".

Establishment of Maharaja Ranjit Singh College is a dream come true for **Dr. R. S. Makhija**, our founder managing trustee. The institute was established to materialize the pious feelings of Indians residing far from motherland to empower the youth of the country to build a stronger nation.

Paul, former Post Master General are also the advisory board members. They are the mentors who always stand by our side at all the crucial stages of development.

Dr. Ram Shrivastav, retired Principal of Autonomous Holkar Science College, Indore is presently the Chairman of MRSC. Our first Chairman Dr. S. S. Sareen was a Retired Secretary to Government of M.P., Bhopal. He was preceded by B. K. Punjabi an eminent historian. The institution blossomed from 43 students to thousand students under their leadership. CEO Sh. Satvinder Singh efficiently executes the policies and administration.

It is evident from the fact that a continuous support for the academic growth of faculty led to more than a dozen teachers completing their Ph. D., MBA Executive and M. Tech Degrees while working in the college.

The student teacher relationship of mentor and mentee, of mother and child, of friends in need makes the student comfortable in the campus and free to share the achievements and hurdles in their life with our teachers. MRSC has produced industrialists, economists, bureaucrats scientists, teachers, journalists, actors, singers, choreographers, producers, and many more. Visionary leadership of the college directed the college growth from 43 students in B. Sc. (Microbiology-Chemistry-Pharmaceutical Chemistry 1994) to a stepwise addition of varied courses at UG and PG level. As the college grew further, increasing it's infrastructure, library and laboratories new courses such as B. Com., BBA, BCA and new subject combinations in B. Sc. in next ten years were added. This was further augmented with Ph. D., M. Com. and M. Sc. in various subjects.

Mission

The mission statement has been designed keeping in mind the ideals laid by our founders Dr. R. S. Makhija, Managing Trustee, Dr. Ramesh Badlani, Chairman, Indo Friends Foundation Trust, Dr, Arun Patwa eminent surgeon and member and all other trust members. The trust aims at providing education of global standards at an affordable fee to the student fraternity. The mission statement indicates the spirit of competitiveness and the urge for excellence to be inculcated in each and every student. The mission to achieve financial freedom in their chosen field is empathetically developed in the students so that they sustainably progress in their fields.

We believe that a person must be educated and not only graduated. The students takes admission in our institute in their moulding stage and we try to groom them to deal with their financial as well as social situations. Text book matter may help him/her earn high degrees but she/he will be a successful person only if she/he is contented. To attain this situation, we need to take care of all round development of the student. Grooming of students' personality is done by involving them in sports, music, NSS, dance, social, environmental care activities besides classroom teaching and experimentation. The components of this report truly reflect the efforts done by the institute in above respect.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

1. Elaborate infrastructure – MRSCPS runs on it's owned land and building which is constructed in a planned manner to facilitate academic, cultural and sports activities. Spacious classrooms, open corridors, required basic amenities, playground, parking area, canteen makes student's campus life comfortable.
2. Well-equipped and spacious laboratories – One of the strongest points of MRSCPS is regular practical

training in all subjects. All the subjects having practical syllabus are dealt with intense care. The laboratories have all the required equipments to give hands on training to each and every individual candidate. Thorough training of students in experimental skills has rewarded us in the form of repeated recruitment of our students in certain organizations.

3. Well structured library – Library has varied collection of books for all subjects amounting to 14504 books of 3201 titles. There are separate sections for referencing and issuing of books for UG and PG courses.
4. Updated Qualified Teachers– In order to provide education to students of global standards we have a good number Ph. D. teachers. Many teachers are regularly upgrading their educational qualifications with support of college management. Teachers have been sharing their research and knowledge with the society along with college students by delivering Invited talks, research papers and conference presentations.
5. Experiential learning - Regular activities for students to undergo experiential learning by Workshop, Industrial Visits, Educational Tours, Conferences, Seminars, Webinars, Expert Lectures etc.
6. Research Exposure - Research exposure for students and their training for writing research thesis and papers along with conference presentations.
7. WIFI Campus – College campus has augmented the WIFI facility which has enabled us to conduct online classes very smoothly.
8. Rich Alumni Base - Huge support of alumni for providing expert talks, internships and placements.

Institutional Weakness

1. Research Centre in the Developing Stage - Our College is not recognized as a research centre for Commerce, Management and Biological Sciences yet and the target has been set to get the institute recognized soon in the next few years.
2. Introduction of New Post Graduation Courses - There are still a few departments where Post Graduate Courses need to be introduced such as Computer Science & Allied Subjects and Arts department.
3. Certificate Courses - The lack of academic flexibility should be comprehended by extra time to be given to students in certificate courses. The knowledge gap within the class or batch of students makes teaching a real challenge and has to be reduced by methods like preparative classes.
4. Diverse Educational Backgrounds - Huge diversity in the background education of students at the time of admission which makes it very difficult to bring them upto a required level.

Institutional Opportunity

1. Collaboration with IT and Pharma Industry – Growing demand of professional graduates and post graduates has created an opportunity to collaborate with IT, Pharmaceutical and Food industries. We have research collaborations with institutions, hospitals and some pharmaceutical industries and we are in process of extending these.
2. Agri-Entrepreneurs - We have a large number of students from rural backgrounds who own agricultural land. We wish to encash this opportunity by training them for eco-friendly organic farming. Various courses taught in MRSCPS including Environmental Microbiology, Environmental Biotechnology, Plant Biotechnology train students to use Microbial Fertilizers and Insecticides. We make them understand the merits of biological methods of crop production improvement and avoid chemical fertilizers and insecticides which has already damaged all life forms including plants, animals and humans. Moreover the soil health is extensively damaged.

3. Recognized Research Centre for Research in Chemical Sciences – Being recognized as research centre the department helps junior teachers, post graduate students and researchers from all over other institutes to work for their Ph. D. research.
4. Grooming Students - Grooming students coming from relatively remote areas through the events organized in the institute like Personality contest, Stressbuster, Competitive events based on science and technology and Friendship Day.
5. Eco-friendly Green Campus - MRSCPS has a vast open land area which can be designed further to enhance the greenery. We have hired a Consultant for Green Audit of our campus who has guided us on waste management of various kinds and augmenting the diversity of flora and fauna in the campus. Establishment of Navgrah garden and Butterfly garden is proposed.

Institutional Challenge

1. Rural Development of Adjoining Areas - We are fortunate to have numerous students from adjoining rural areas, where educational institutes have comparatively less facilities. We take up this as our responsibility to upgrade the students from such background and send them back to their native places so that all the parts of our country progress.
2. Adapting to Fluctuating Examination Pattern/Syllabus - Frequently changes in syllabus and examination pattern brings about numerous hurdles in smooth functioning of the courses, we try and adapt to the new system but it definitely affects the results.
3. Language – Special attention is required for students from weaker sections. Books of some science subjects are not available in hindi, which makes it difficult for Hindi medium students to revise those subjects. Teachers help students by giving experiment matter and providing notes in Hindi as knowledge should be restricted by the language barriers.
4. Financial Constraints of Students - Some students studying in our institute are from weaker sections which makes it very difficult for us to collect fees in time. This affects the yearly budgeting but the management permits late fees payment till exam time to some students on humanitarian grounds.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The course curriculum dealt with in our institute covers a wide range of concepts and professional skills. We follow Devi Ahilya Vishwavidyalaya's syllabus and curricular schedule. The course combinations offered are according to the requirement of professionals in the society. As we have limited freedom for modulation of course content, we emphasize on following creative methods to enrich students' brains. Regular certification courses, workshops, field projects and research projects are conducted to make the students understand the implementation of their syllabus content.

The teachers are empowered to teach their subject as per the need in theory, practice using Black Board, Presentations, Videos etc to make the students interested to know more and develop the right concepts.

Activity and academic schedule is prepared in alignment with the University and Higher Education schedule. Conceptual and practical classes are scheduled after thorough discussion among departmental heads and coordinators for smooth conduction. Teachers prepare and provide study material for required course contents. During Covid 19 pandemic session, all teachers prepared course materials in powerpoint presentation formats

and pdf files to help students in the absence of availability of offline interaction and visits to laboratories and library.

Faculty members are a part of various committees in the university such as Executive Council, Board of Studies, Research Degree Committee, Sports Committee, Flying Squad, Examination Panel for affiliating university and other universities.

Faculty members have varied roles to play besides teaching the curriculum in classroom. Mentoring of students in their research projects, field work and internships curves the student towards meticulous planning, working and effective report presentation. Students have performed exceptionally well by presenting their research work in international and national conferences. Some of them have also published their research papers in reputed journals.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Empowering students with latest technical skills and conceptual knowledge we actualize our mission of Imparting value-added Education of Global standards to help the student work for competitive excellence & financial freedom. Quality standards of teaching theoretical concepts and training the students in practical skills is the prime focus of all the faculty members of the institute. Completion of syllabus and evaluation of students is taken as top priority work. The teaching process is enhanced by adopting various methods of experiential and participative learning. This develops students' interest in respective fields. We are able to increase the attendance of students time to time by conducting such extra-academic activities where students apply their curricular knowledge for practical work. The quality of our students can be well evaluated by the high percentage of Final year results at both PG and UG level. Students also secure merit positions in university regularly and are also rewarded by the college with medals during the Annual Function. In order to deliver depth of knowledge to students MRSC focuses on qualified teachers and encourages them continuously to upgrade themselves.

Teaching is not limited within the periphery of syllabus but is extended in all directions by outspreading student's knowledge through attending and organizing guest lectures, institutional & industrial visits, seminars, conferences, educational tours, literary activities, environmental awareness activities etc. Such enhancement programs were done practically before Covid 19 pandemic and we changed our gears to online after the pandemic. Expert lectures in the form of webinars, international web conferences, online industrial visits along with regular online lectures were our tools to maintain the knowledge transmission to students. All the teachers adapted completely to online mode of teaching during lockdown period. The video lectures prepared at EMRC, DAVV Indore for Educational Communication India under National Mission on Education, ICT, Ministry of Human Resource Development, India were shared with students for their better understanding.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Most of the faculty members in the institute are holding Ph. D degree and are engaged in research in their respective fields. Our institute is a recognized research centre for Ph. D. students in Chemistry. We have teachers as registered Ph. D. guides (Devi Ahilya Vishwavidhyalaya) in Biotechnology, Microbiology, Chemistry, Management, Commerce and Hindi who are guiding research scholars on respective topics. Teachers and students have marked their names at International and National levels via publications in a wide range of reputed journals. We have contributed significantly to the knowledge bank besides paper publications.

Teachers and students have numerous sequence submissions in the international reserve i.e. National Center for Biotechnology Information (NCBI) and microbial cultures deposited at National Collection of Industrial Microorganisms (NCIM).

Government funded research projects are also sanctioned to teachers by Madhya Pradesh Council of Science & Technology, Madhya Pradesh Biotechnology Council, Madhya Pradesh Biodiversity Board, Department of Science & Technology. Chemical Sciences department worked on

Research scholars from various institutes approach us to guide different parts of their study. Research is also conducted in collaboration with IIT and other institutes in Biosciences and Chemical Sciences. Students from different parts of the country have visited for carrying out their research study for Doctoral, M. Phil, Post Graduate and Graduate level in our institute.

Research is an integral part in our institute with Post Graduate courses also. Students are promoted to work on various dimensions and publish their work in reputed journals. There are numerous research presentation from our institute in international and national conferences. We have more than 150 Conference Presentations by the entire MRSC family.

Teachers also provide research and industrial consultancy to institutes and industries respectively. These industries provide internship and placements to our students as apart of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with them. We work on research projects in collaboration with hospitals also.

Our alumni are well placed for doctoral degrees and post-doctoral research in international (overseas) and national institutes like IIT.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college campus spread in 10 acres have well planned buildings and playgrounds. The play grounds are surrounded by concrete walking track. MRSCPS college campus has three building constructions - White building (3 floors in 2 wings front and left wing constructed carpet area 150000 sq.ft.) and an open zone of 5 acre. and Red building used for MBA and MCA courses and Yellow building for school. There is a 3 acers open ground, Gymnasium (650 sq.ft.) swimming pool area (5000 sq.ft.), volley ball court (5000 sq. ft.) and basketball court (15000 sq.ft.), parking area (10388 sq.ft.), open air canteen (7200 sq.ft.), cement-concrete roads (15000 sq.ft.), plantation (8000 sq.ft.) an Auditorium (1500 sq ft).and open land for further construction. Well maintained garden along the buildings and road beautify the campus.

The classrooms are fully furnished and well-ventilated, some of which are equipped with LCD projector. Laboratories are equipped with required instruments and designed according to the experiments in the curriculum. MRSCPS authorities believe that concepts can be learnt best by actually practicing them through experimentation, therefore experiential learning is optimally carried out. The laboratory establishment (equipments, regular consumables like chemicals, glassware, miscellaneous items etc.) speaks by itself for the benchmark facilities.

The library has exhaustive matter on all the subjects of science, commerce, management and arts. Reference as well as issue sections have sufficient number of books to cater the need of students. Students can get books issued according to the rules of the library. The infrastructure is augmented according to the updates in the curriculum and addition of new courses in the college. There is drinking water facility and washrooms on all

the floors.

Open air sit out canteen is near the left wing of white building. The canteen has a preparation and storage room and is outsourced to provide n 100 students at a time with snacks and tea/coffee cold drinks and smoking is prohibited.

Student Support and Progression

Numerous activities are planned throughout the year for enlightening the students and widening their horizons to prepare them for future. Besides regular theory and practical classes we organize guest lectures, seminars, webinars, workshops, industrial and institutional visits, conferences, educational tours, career counselling sessions, CV & interview preparation sessions to make them acquainted to the real world working conditions. Annual function is a very important event of the year and we take up a theme every year to spread sensitivity and humanity in the society. Large number of students participate in this event. Students are also given responsibilities to inculcate the sense of leadership in them. We conduct personality contest in the annual function for which we hire trainers to improve the lifestyle and personality of the students. Some students who participated in this are successfully pursuing their career in showbusiness. Students are encouraged to participate regularly in youth festival and sports activities at university, state and national levels. This is to nurture and spin out best of the talents in an individual. Not only participation but students have also won various events at all levels. Educational tours make students strong and tactful as they travel in distant parts of the country and face various challenges. Besides personal growth of the students we also support them financially by various scholarship schemes other than government scholarships. We have numerous collaborations and MoU's with industries and institutes to help students do trainings and have placements. Placement activities are regularly conducted for graduate and post graduate level students. A very important role is played by our alumni in helping the students develop their personal and professional skills. Our old students regularly visit our college for not only refreshing their memories but also for delivering guest lectures, giving training and placements. Some of the alumni are established industrialists who permit our students for industrial visits. Teachers mentor students for their professional as well as personal matters. Student's grievances are sensitively and logically dealt through a proper procedure. Students are also nurtured for playing responsible roles in college events which grooms them to develop leadership qualities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

MRSC offers a conducive environment for teachers and students along with providing extensive opportunities for their growth and development. The flow of responsibilities and related information is made very simple by the college management. The routine work in department is taken care by the Heads who have to report to the Principal. The departments have to work in collaboration with each other as the UG programs have different combinations of subjects. A course coordinator is appointed for each segment of the UG and PG programs who establishes the harmonious coordination of all the departments in teaching along with the activity calendar.

Providing good quality education and life skills to students is the prime focus of college authorities and to achieve this goal a proper working channel is established in the institute. Principal briefs about various motives to work upon in the beginning of the session and the head of departments and coordinators are suppose to plan various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Teachers are appointed as coordinators for academic, cultural, sports, arts, literary or other extra-curricular activities to be conducted. Teachers mentor students to take-up charge and responsibilities for conduction of different events. This hierarchy enables delegation of

duties and powers for smooth conduction of all the activities.

Management supports teachers for upgrading their educational qualifications. Numerous teachers have done their entire Ph. D. work in the college. Several teachers have worked for higher degrees like MBA Executive and M. Tech.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

MRSC believes in carving the students as responsible citizens who are empowered with education, have empathy for fellow beings, nurture the feelings of patriotism in their hearts, have logical thinking and a dream to give something back to the society. Days of national and international importance are celebrated to emphasize and inculcate these values among students.

Students are promoted to coordinate and participate in various events in order to polish them to take up responsibilities. Some events like Health Awareness Camp and Festive bash are very good examples of students' involvement in organizing and conducting an event. Students carry out all the analytical tests during Health Awareness Camp and put-up healthy food stalls. Festive Bash also gives an opportunity to students to exhibit their managerial and marketing skills. Sense of responsibility towards elders and needy section of the society is inculcated among students by making them visit blind school and old age homes. Students and teachers visit these centers with gifts and spend time with the inmates to share happiness and make the learning moments memorable.

MRSCPS owns a large green campus rich in trees and plants harboring natural fauna. Care takers clean the grounds and trim the trees as and when required. Shady trees and beautiful flowers provide a soothing atmosphere. Navgrah garden was established which got overgrown during Covid 19 pandemic lockdown. We have planned to reestablish it again.

Best practices of our institution assists us in adding value in our lives by building social and emotional responsibility towards mankind. The health awareness camp organized every year in the campus helps in educating students and staff members about rising health concerns and also aids in spreading health related awareness. To inculcate social responsibilities amongst students, our institute also takes part in various social activities like donating clothes and essential items to needy people; students and faculty members' visits old age home and orphanage from time to time; inviting senior citizens and blind school students in the campus and felicitating them. Thus, best practices of the institution help in promoting value-based education and narrows economic disparities in the society.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through conduction of meticulously planned theory as well as practicals according to the academic calendar based strictly on the University and Higher Education`s academic calendar as our institute is affiliated to DAVV, Indore. The schedule declared by the Principal is passed on to all the coordinators and head of the departments for planning. A meeting is called in the beginning of the session to discuss on the major issues regarding academics.

Regular notifications received by the university on university website and circulars are communicated to all the departments for execution of the policies.

The course coordinators and head of the departments prepare the schedule for interdisciplinary subjects. Subjects are allotted to all the teachers based on their expertise so that the students receive best of the knowledge.

The information regarding academic and activity action plans is displayed on notice board and college website.

The course coordinators keep a thorough track of the time table and teaching plan so that the syllabus is completed within the stipulated time. Teachers keep a record of all the assignments allotted to them in a daily dairy.

The unplanned holidays are compensated by the extra classes taken by the teachers for required subjects. The schedule for CCE, Practical Exams and Theory Exams is communicated to the students through college notice boards and also loaded on social media groups and college website.

Campus is equipped with wi-fi internet facility which is also available to all the teachers and students. Our institute also promotes ICT as we understand that some fundamentals and theories can be explained better by audio visual methods and animations.

Laptops and three LCDs are available for conducting audio visual sessions.

The basic mode of curriculum delivery in the institute is classroom interaction. Special emphasis is given for effective curriculum delivery by making extra efforts to convey the knowledge to varied calibre of students.

Teachers provide study materials to students which makes them understand the frame and depth of the course which they need to study. Teachers also help students who have language problem such as; they guide hindi medium students to prepare notes and practical records. There is a separate departmental

library in some departments which issue books to the needy students as and when they require.

All the streams plan expert talks, industrial and field visits and other creative methods to enhance student's knowledge. The students are also made to attend live classrooms such as learning about wildlife with mother nature. Students visited Badgonda and Ralamandal for observing the diversity of birds in this region, sericulture department for visualizing the synthesis of natural silk by silkworm. PG and UG Chemistry, Pharmaceutical Chemistry, Microbiology and Biotechnology students visit the pharmaceutical companies for studying the parenteral and oral preparations. Students also visit food, biofertilizer, bioinsecticide production industries for getting acquainted to the industrial working technology. Students of Computer Science, Commerce and Management department regularly visit software companies and manufacturing units for understanding the working procedures.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

Our institute follows Devi Ahilya Vishwavidhyalaya's academic and activity calendar. The commencement of classes, conduction of internal theory evaluation, practical examinations and sports activities are scheduled according to University calendar. Dates for CCE are announced and displayed on the notice board

Systematic theory and practical classes are conducted for all the courses and the syllabus completion status is checked by Course coordinators, Head of the departments and Principal at regular intervals. In case of unplanned holidays, teachers take extra theory and practical classes. At the end of session students are made to undergo pre-university and pre-practical examination as a revision process for them which also helps in preparing them for final examination.

Internal evaluation is a continuous process in our institute. Teachers have adopted different methods for evaluation of students. Evaluation of students is done by different methods in order to give them a chance to prove their ability. Subjective and objective written tests, classroom teaching, power point presentations, report and assignment preparation and quiz are some of the methods adopted.

Internal tests are conducted and the answers written by the students are discussed in the class and they are guided as to how to enrich their answers.

In another method, students in a class are divided into 2 groups and quiz is conducted to check the concepts grasped by them during the lecture.

Students are also taught to prepare powerpoint presentations and they present their topics in class by this mode. Classroom teaching is also one of the methods adopted by some teachers for CCE, where students are allotted topics which they are supposed to teach in class.

Internal evaluation is also done by giving assignments to the students which helps them to prepare for final exams.

Practical subjects in commerce are dealt with making the students solve problems in classroom and the fast and slow learners are spotted. Teachers encourage students to ask doubts and every teacher solves students' doubts in their free lectures in one-on-one mode.

Report of industrial and field visits are also prepared by students to express their updation.

The extent of retention of students is also analysed after their participation in a conference or a workshop. A post conference session or a post workshop session is conducted where the students share their learnings and experiences with other students who could not attend these programmes, in this way the other students are updated with whatever they have missed and the participants are evaluated on their retention capacity.

Students who are doing research projects are made to give presentations on their findings time to time which help in analysing students' development.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Heterogeneous group of students appear in all programmes. Most of the students in institute are from nearby towns and villages. Many of them have not been exposed to required standards at school or undergraduate level whereas some of them possess immense capability which only needs to be guided correctly. Teachers identify student's grasping capacity and inquisitiveness in the classroom while teaching. We analyse previous results of students. Internal tests are carried out in order to check their learning capacity. Teachers discuss about previous class matter in the beginning of lectures and analyse that how many students are able to answer. The students are categorised on the basis of their willingness and quality of answers. While carrying out experiments in science subjects the students who are fast learners are promoted to pick up research work in promising direction. This helps them learn something beyond their syllabus. The slow learners are advised to carry out simple projects which help them to clear their concepts practically and make them ready to face the competitive world for their future endeavours.

Methods adopted for channelizing the energy of fast learners:-

- Advanced learners are groomed to get involved in activities beyond their curriculum. They are encouraged to take up live projects or plan certain workshops or seminars. We understand that these students can manage their curriculum very well and must be introduced and trained for real world conditions which they will be entering soon. Some students are good in sports, some in cultural activities, some in studies and others in research.
- Shraddha and Poorva Patel had undergone training in Pearl Culture and conducted a workshop on this for teachers and students of the college.
- Students good at sports are groomed accordingly to represent college, university, state and national level also.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to present their research work in International & National conferences.
- Students with high intellect are groomed to get higher secured positions in University merit list.

Measures for improving the performance of slow learners:-

- Hindi medium students hesitate to interact. Teachers give them extra time for preparing their practical files and notes in Hindi so that the concept reaches the students without the barrier of language.
- Regular doubt solving sessions and extra classes are conducted for these students so that they can cope up well.
- Special counselling is done for students who are observed not participating in regular academic and cultural activities. These sessions develop confidence inside them and they feel equal with others.
- Regular motivational sessions and subject related extra-academic activities such as industrial or field visits for slow learners to avoid drop out.

- Post Graduate and Graduate Level students participate in workshops, seminars and conferences, guest lectures to upgrade themselves in their respective subjects
- Skill development workshops are organized every year for students where they are made to experience the professional skills which can be enchashed for jobs or establishing production houses.
- Industrial and institutional visits are planned regularly to make the students ready for future. Students explore pharmaceutical, food processing industries, cosmetic industries, fermentation, agro-based industries, dairy and garment manufacturing industries, bio fertilizer and bio insecticides industries, research institutes and pathology and blood bank departments in hospitals according to the application of their courses.
- **Problem Solving Methodologies**
 - Students attend various educational and recreational tours where they learn to organize these programmes and carry them out efficiently. They learn to solve issues when they are out of their comfort zones in different cities.
 - Solving research problems, designing experiments, troubleshooting the hurdles during experimentation trains the students to orient their brains towards problem solving methodologies.
 - While organizing workshops and events such as Health Awareness Camps or Festive Bash students are given responsibilities to carry out the events smoothly. They come across various challenges which they try and solve by teamwork.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

Teachers impart knowledge to the students effectively by using different teaching methods ranging from chalk board, animations, Video clippings, Audio system, online sources, and power point presentations to video lectures. The basic tool for teaching is chalk board but most of the teachers use some or the other computer-oriented method for giving a better understanding of the concept. Most of the faculty use interactive methods for teaching. The major emphasis is on classroom interaction in terms of research paper presentations, seminars, debates, group discussions, assignments, quiz/tests/viva and laboratory work.

Our teachers have developed e-content on various topics as a member of Swayam online courses. The e-content developed by the teachers are available on youtube as well as college library for easy access to students. Teachers have also developed their YouTube channels to share the teaching content with the students. Effective explanation on working of equipments is dealt with showing short videos or animations available on youtube and other internet sources. The departments have been issued LCD projectors which can be used by the teachers. All the departments have computer systems and can also get the laptops issued for preparation of presentations.

Power point presentation (PPT) is a very common tool used for delivering the mechanism-based topics. The PPTs are enabled with animations and simulations to improve the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process.

Scientific processes are very well explained by animations and videos. Teachers develop their own presentations and have developed a teaching material reserve for the students.

The library has numerous interactive CDs which are used by teachers for explaining the concepts to the students. The library also has numerous e-books which can be used by the students.

Students are also trained to prepare power point presentations and deliver talk along with it. We have computer laboratories well equipped with machines having latest configuration where students not only learn about the computer science related subjects syllabus matter but also can use these labs for developing their skills. Our institute also issues laptops to students who want to learn and prepare power point presentations. During the lockdown due to Covid 19 pandemic all the teachers used Zoom, Google meet or Microsoft teams for classes. The online learning environments are designed to train students in open problem-solving activity. Mathematical subjects are taught in online mode, teachers have used various online tools like- whiteboard in Microsoft teams, Google forms and Google meet, etc.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The continuous cumulative evaluation (CCE) is a part of the university examination system.

Internal assessment of the student is done at various levels. It starts with the regular classroom teaching where teachers encourage students to interact, the response by students is analyzed and the students are further nurtured accordingly. Next level is in the form of CCE Internal evaluation of students is done by different methods such as subjective tests, objective tests, surprise tests, assignments, group discussions, quiz, classroom teaching and presentations.

The students are well informed for the tests to be taken as CCE beforehand and the marks obtained by them are also known to them. In case a student is not able to score well or not able to attend the CCE because of some unavoidable reasons he/she is given another chance to appear for the internal evaluation. The students scoring less are also counseled separately in order to improve their performance next time.

A variety of modes are adopted for assessing students at different levels. Besides regular pattern of tests sudden viva-voce, power-point presentation by post graduate level students on theoretical topics, quiz competition and group discussion for commerce & management graduate level students.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

The internal examination process is completely transparent; the students are well informed about the mode of internal assessment by the teacher. They are assessed on only those topics which have been covered by the teachers and guidance has been given for the subject matter. The teacher explain the answer expected and If the student feels he/she has scored less the teachers clear their doubts in the classroom or counsels them or guides separately as and when required.

Departmental Level: The continuous evaluation of students is carried out by faculty regarding theory lectures, lab, assignments, and unit tests. The internal marks are allotted based on defined strategies and informed to students individually. Query if any is discussed with faculty and Head of the department. The grievances during the conduction of theory examinations are considered and discussed in consultation with Head of the Department and if necessary forwarded to the Principal.

Any student who is not satisfied with the assessment and award of marks may approach the concern Head of the department who can intervene and seek opinion of another course teacher.

College Level: The Institute follows open evaluation system where the student performance is displayed on the notice board. If a student is not able to appear for examination due to medical or any genuine reason examination is conducted for that student as per norms, provided that he/she submits application with proper documents. If any student scores less marks and wants to improve in that subject, he/she can appear for the improvement examination.

The grievances of the students with reference to assessment are made clear by showing his/her performance in the answer sheet. The answer sheet of such student is assessed by the faculty once again in the presence of the student. Any corrections in the total of marks or assessment of answer books as identified by students are immediately done by the faculty members

University level: With reference to evaluation, if the student scores less mark than expected, he/she can apply for reevaluation of his/her answer script after paying the prescribed fee. The student is guided by the faculty in this respect.

The institute is spread in an area of 10 acres which includes constructed area as well as playgrounds. Campus has three building constructions having classrooms, laboratories and offices. The land area includes gymnasium, swimming pool, volley ball court, basketball court, parking area, seminar hall and open air canteen. The playgrounds are surrounded by cement-concrete roads and plantation area. The open area of about 500000 sqft. is left for further planning and construction.

The design of building allows proper ventilation in classrooms and well-lit corridors. There are 15 classrooms and 7 laboratories. The laboratory establishment speaks by itself about its facilities.

Chemical Sciences laboratory is adequately cross ventilated having 40 work stations for students. Intensive technical training of students is done on a range of instruments such as UV-Vis Spectrophotometer, Polarimeter Polarograph, Karl Fisher Titrator, Flame photometer, Nephelometer.

Biosciences laboratory is a remarkable structure in itself having 44 workstations for students. They become efficient in handling Cooling Centrifuge, Laminar air flow, PCR machine, UV-Vis Spectrophotometer, Orbital Shaker, Environmental Incubator and autoclaves and learn microbiological, molecular biology, biochemical, immunotechniques, plant tissue culture and other experimental methods.

Computer Science lab is well equipped with latest configuration machines. Students skills are developed using Ubuntu and Windows 7. We train students using various databases like oracle and Wamp Server.

Physics laboratory holds 20 work stations in basic lab and 20 in dark room, the optics laboratory. Both the labs are effectively equipped for physics practicals related to measurement, optics and electronics. Specially designed Optics laboratory can facilitate benchmark level light experiments.

Electronics laboratory is well equipped for conducting graduate level Electronics practicals where students develop skills related to modulation, simulation, basic and digital electronics and assembly language programming on microprocessor.

Wifi connection is available in the entire building. All the laboratories along with room number 1,2,3, 5,6,7, 11,12 and 13 have LAN facility. LCD projectors are issued to all the departments. White boards for projection are present in many classrooms and laboratories.

Seminar Hall

Well furnished, air-conditioned Seminar Hall with sound system, LCD projector, LAN and wifi facility to accommodate 120 members.

Gymnasium

Important equipment for students' fitness and exercising are available in the gymnasium.

Faculty staffroom

Commerce and Management, Mathematics and Language department teachers have comfortable staffrooms on the ground floor which is equipped with LAN connected computer systems for their day-to-day work.

Library

Library has separate issue and reference sections. We have 14501 books and 3401 titles. We have an e-resource centre where students can search study material using internet.

Sports

Students are trained to participate in various indoor and outdoor sports. We have valley ball court, basketball court, table tennis court, cricket and football ground, swimming pool and gymnasium. Students participate every year in intercollegiate level, university, division, state and national level from our college in various sports.

There are video camera and CCTV covering the campus entrance and ground which is connected with the recording set in the office. There is a DG set for the use in White building.

Academics sufficed with total personality development is focussed at Maharaja Ranjit Singh College of Professional Sciences. The institution ensures optimum participation of students in cultural, literary and sports and other activities by circulating prompt information about inter and intra college events through notices circulated and announced by class teachers in each class encouraging students to participate. Facilities such as practice halls, mike systems, playgrounds and sports equipments are made available to the students as an when required.

Optimum productivity of an individual can be delivered to the society only by multidimensional personality development. Physical activities along with entertainment, play an important role in preparing the student's brain for studies. The enthusiasm of a student is kept high by engaging them time to time in

activities such as Intra and Inter college song and dance competitions, Freshers` and Farewell party, Red Day also known as Friendship Day, skits on some special days and Annual Function. Auditorium is regularly used by students for practice sessions and final day programmes. Friendship's Day celebrated as Red Day is usually conducted in open air space with highly loaded Music system operated by Disco Jockey.

We have collaborated with Mr. Balbeer Singh Kushwah from Volacano Dance Academy, Indore who prepares our students for all these events. Along with solo, group song and dance performances we also conduct theme-based Personality Contest to encourage students to groom themselves as socially responsible citizens. Old is Gold was the theme in 2016-17; Old Age Home residents were facilitated on stage in the Annual Function. The Galore and Valour of Indian rulers and freedom fighters was celebrated in 2017-18 Annual Function. The theme for 25th Annual Function in 2018-19 was Pinnacle Professionals which was dedicated to members of the society and MRSC family members who have contributed to the success of our institute. Indian rich tradition and culture 2019-20 Galore and Valour of Indian Freedom Fighters. Rehearsals for all these events are held in halls vacated for specific time period and the final show of Annual Function is held on a grand stage specially mounted with an elaborate shamiyana.

The cultural facilities within the campus are as per requirement. Auditorium is available for Inter and Intra-college events, Guest Lectures, Seminars, Workshops etc. The movable furniture in classrooms is removed during the week long annual function to generate more space for practice sessions. The college has in-house portable music systems, three in numbers along with mike systems and additional speakers to aid in proper training of students for the annual day function practice and any inter college events such as youth festival.

A complete set of facilities required for various games like basketball, volleyball, cricket, chess, badminton etc. are available and provided for practice session and final events organised within the campus. Gymnasium facility is available and used by teachers and students. Yoga and meditation sessions are organised time to time to channelize the youth energy to attain work life balance.

With the development in information technology worldwide our campus infrastructure is also upgrading concomitantly. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled and sufficient computer systems are provided at points of requirement for administrative and academic purposes.

Our computers labs are well equipped and same facilities are round the clock accessible by the students. We have four computer laboratories. Our computer systems are configured with latest hardware and are connected to our campus LAN. Our campus LAN is connected to the dedicated internet leased line of 40 Mbps with 1:1 contention ratio. We have LCD projectors, laptops with latest configurations to provide interactive class room (ICR) teaching to students. We have one additional 40 mbps internet connection RF line also as backup. The students do not access the unidentified sites inside the campus. The students should not download any vulnerable sites that may contain virus. To avoid the vulnerability and to ensure the cyber security college camps Wi-Fi is protected by fire wall so that our camps LAN always remains safe from vulnerable sites and students are not able to access the restricted sites.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.**Response:**

The laboratories, library, sports equipment, computers are routinely taken care by a respective protocol suitable for them. The maintenance of the entire infrastructure is done through a proper working channel. There are people in-charge in the college office who are suppose to call concerned persons for maintenance work such as electrician, plumber, internet issues, carpenter, computer printer maintenance, gas connections etc.

o

All seven labs are maintained and the equipment, glassware, chemicals and miscellaneous items are recorded in stock registers. Laboratory items are routinely verified after the Annual/End semester exam in May/June each year. The equipments, chemicals, glassware, apparatus or any other item which is required in the laboratories is purchase after calling quotations. There is a system for orienting the student to lab rules and regulations and list of experiments to be performed throughout the year. Students are also regularly instructed and vigilantly assisted by faculty members and lab staff regarding the precautions and dos and don'ts. The lab staffs are instructed by faculty to-do all the preparations for the practical as per the class schedule. A register for issue and use of chemicals, glass wares and instruments as per the case is also maintained. The instruments are regularly cleaned and serviced by the in-house staff. Any breakdown is handled by services from out service vendors.

Library

The library encompasses books of all subjects taught in college in reference as well as issue section. Library stock is updated as and when required. UG students can get the books issued for seven days on two cards provided to them at the start of the course. A PG student gets three cards and can get book issued for 15 days. A provision for fine for late submission is also implemented. Rules for entry and exit of students and maintaining the right behaviour in the library are also informed. To ensure that maximum students use library facilities they are informed during orientation and also encouraged to participate in annual library events during August 12th Library day. An award for the staff and students using library facilities to maximum is also instituted. Maintenance of books in Almeria and stock verification is done by the library staff on yearly basis in May - June.

Computer lab staff regularly maintains all the systems, Wi-Fi connections and other computer peripherals and each of the unrepeatable entity is regularly replaced. The maintenance of printer/scanner re-inking etc. is done by outsourced vendors.

Classrooms

Regular cleaning and maintenance of class-rooms, blackboards, green boards, tube lights fans, benches is done by in house staff. Class IV staff and a carpenter does the required routine maintenance. Electric accessories are maintained by our sourced staff.

Sports facilities

Sports facilities of the college are regularly used and maintained by sports department. Outside vendors and suppliers are entrusted to do the job of maintenance or repair as the case may be. Yearly sports calendar and practice sessions are conducted to match the timings of competitive intercollege - university level, district level and division events.

The institute-Maharaja Ranjit Singh College of Professional Sciences has a well-defined, formalized organization structure under the able direction of Indo Friends Foundation Trust that oversees the smooth

functioning of the administrative and academic process of the institute. For the effective and efficient functioning of all the administrative as well as academic activities, the institute's Trust has adopted a decentralized approach, wherein the Trust regulates the overall functioning of the institute through the Governing Body (GB) at the institute level. The Governing Body (GB) monitors the day-to-day functioning of the institute through the top management and takes necessary decisions and actions as and when required. The body has 10 members including the Chairman and Secretary of the Trust, the institute founder and managing trustee, 1 invited member nominated by the government (Government representative), 2 invited members nominated by the university (DAVV), 2 representatives from the teaching faculty and Head (Principal) of the Institute as the Member Secretary. The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Institute is both the secretary as well as member of the Indo Friends Foundation Trust and Governing Body respectively. Presently the Chairman is Dr. Ram Shrivastava, Dr. R.S. Makhija-Founder and Managing Trustee, Dr. Suresh Silawat- Government representative, Dr. A.V. Bajaj and Dr. Rekha Gadre (University representatives) and Dr. Dipak Sharma and Dr. Pushpendra Dubey (Teacher's representative).

The Principal of the Institute is the head of administrative and academic activities and in conjunction with the Course coordinators, Heads of departments, Activities coordinators and the IQAC Committee monitors the overall functioning of the institute for its academic, administrative and financial growth. The Course Coordinators (CC) for each course designs, plans and implements the academic curriculum as per the university guidelines and is responsible for the successful and timely completion of the academic and administrative activities and reports to the Principal. 6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Quality teaching is assured from quality teachers and progress of Institution is directly correlated with the teaching quality it delivers to the students. Teachers quality performance are the basis of appraisal which is offered to them by the management of the Institution and our Institution follows a fool proof mechanism for appraisal based on their performance. Such system helps in motivating faculty staff members and making them focused towards specific objectives. The process of appraisal is scheduled twice a year in consultation with concerned faculty member.

Getting funded research projects or providing consultancies to Industries and other Institutions are also appreciated greatly. Publication of their research in quality high rated journals is also encouraged and considered for appraisal. The appraisal also covers teachers dedication in routine practices of examination conduction, university exam answer sheets evaluation, guiding students for their projects and assignments, counseling students and developing a connect with them in order to bring out their best potential in all avenues. Contributing novel ideas and techniques for practical teaching, ICT tools enhance their performance as teachers. In addition, contribution to corporate life of college by organizing co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for students, Sports, NSS involvement in various activities, team work, leadership and extent of job readiness is preferred for a sound appraisal.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

The Institute regularly conducts internal and external financial audit. It has separate Accounts Department with a designated -Financial officer to ensure maintenance of annual accounts and internal audit. The audit mainly covers, receipts and payments, salary, income and expenditure, gratuity, purchases etc. All the observation and objection if any from the internal audit is communicated through the report to the Management and the Financial officer and accordingly rectification and compliance report is generated and submitted to the Accounts Department. The Ryan Financial Advisor-a Customized software helps in the internal audit. As such no formal budget is sanctioned for the different departments. However, as per requirement, the budget is sanctioned and funds released to the HOD of the department who in turn gets

the approval from the sanctioning authorities, namely the Principal and the CEO. Bills are there upon submitted by the departmental head to the Accounts Department to ensure maintenance of the accounts.

External/Statutory audit is conducted Chartered Accountant (CA)- Anil Kamal Garg & Company who has been appointed by the Managing Committee to carry out the audit. The external audit covers all financial and accounting activities of the institute like all receipts from fees, employee remuneration and benefits, administrative expenses, repairs and maintenance, financial expenses e.g., to vendors, contractors, students' activities, and other service providers and depreciation. External auditors also audit store records, library records, employee attendance records, tax calculation etc. After the completion of the audit, the observations and objections if any are submitted to the institute in the Audit report.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The Institute has a well formulated financial policy which ensures effective and optimal utilization of finances for academic, administrative and development purpose which help ultimately in realizing the Institute's vision and mission. Necessary provisions are made in the books of accounts towards efficient use of the funds available for each academic year. As per the guidelines of the Management and Principal, a report of budget sanctioned and actual expenditure are regularly maintained. The Institute has a well-defined procedure to monitor effective and efficient utilization of available financial resources for infrastructure development and academic processes. Every year, the funds are set aside so as to fulfil the

requirements of the different Departments. Each Department prepares the budget based on the requirement such as equipment, computer as well as consumable required for the academic session. Principal puts up the budget to the Management and after discussion and necessary corrections/modifications Management recommends the budget for approval. As and when required, the Institute makes a provision for advance additional funds. The Principal and the Head of Departments discuss the requirement and decide the priorities while allocating financial resources for various purposes; and also ensure optimum use of available financial resources. The Management studies the annual expenditure, scrutinizes the budget and provides feedback for efficient use of financial resources. The Institute has standardized procedure for sanctioning of funds for various activities including payments to be made to visiting faculty and also for settlement of advance and passing of bills for payment. For this, the faculty /staff members submit their requisition to the HOD of department which is subject to approval by the Principal. After approval by HOD, the purchase requisition (PR) is brought to the Store Manager for the scrutiny and his approval. Thereafter, final approval is made by the Management. After approval of PR by the CEO, Purchase team will process ahead to formulate Purchase Order for purchasing the materials from the approved vendor. A quotation may be invited from another vendor as per requirement. Purchase team will negotiate with vendor for both technical and commercial discussion. Purchase team will take approval of authority and generate purchase order and purchase order is sent to the vendor along with an intimation to the concern department and store for receiving delivery of materials and payment process. After delivery of material at Institute, store department registers the materials which are then subsequently delivered to respective department for utilization of the same.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

To supervise and monitor the quality of academic learning and administrative activities such as academic planning, internal examinations, trainings, placement, industry alliances etc. and to undertake the accreditation process, the Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) was established on 24-7-2019 as per the norms of NAAC guidelines, by the approval of the Governing Body. Since then, IQAC is actively involved in the planning and execution of quality initiatives. For the smooth implementation and continual improvements of quality initiatives, the members of committee conduct regular meetings to frame different quality strategies, policies and plan various activities to achieve the mission of the Institution. The quality initiatives taken up by IQAC are:

1. Strengthening the Mentor-Mentee programme wherein each teacher as a mentor meets their allotted students on a regular basis and communicates the overall performance of their respective mentees to their parents. Implementation of this strategy can be witnessed in improvement in the

student's performance in academic and other activities which has been beneficial for institutional growth.

2. Incorporation of ICT tools for enhancing students' learning quality
3. Continual development of faculty through FDP's, Professional workshops/seminars, Conferences etc. (using online resources also)
4. Encouraging and supporting research paper and poster publications for consistent research and development
5. Add-on courses and skill enhancement programs for students
6. Preparation for obtaining NAAC accreditation

Most of the indented initiatives are progressing well as planned. Out of the many initiatives, the following two activities initiated and monitored by the IQAC explain the same.

Activity 1: Addition of BA Program among the portfolio of courses being offered in the Institute and Skill enhancement programs for employability.

With the changing global scenario, new policies and programs were introduced by the government at the National, Regional and State levels focusing on increasing employability, outcomes and income opportunities for the youth in India. Consequently, it was realized that for the holistic development of students' Arts stream should also be included among the variety of courses being offered by the Institute. Thus, the B.A. Program was started in 2019 along with other multiple courses being successfully run by the Institute.

To develop the employability skills in students as per the specific industry needs, two skill enhancement programs covering finance and marketing fields were conducted. These were: Bajaj Finserv Certification course in finance and insurance sector and Digital Marketing in marketing field. The course duration was 120 hrs. and 30 days respectively. Certificates were awarded upon successful completion of course.

Activity 2: Incorporation of ICT tools for enhancing students' learning quality

Globalization along with continual changes in technology has resulted in increased demand for soft skills and computer knowledge in the students along with their domain knowledge by the industry. Consequently, to fill the gap between curriculum and contemporary needs, IQAC initiated a drive to conduct skill enhancement programs in ICT and computing skills to enhance the employability skills of the graduates. In addition, faculty were encouraged to adopt various ICT tools in their teaching to augment the students' learning quality. Twenty-two teachers have prepared their PPT's on various topics covering their syllabus and incorporated latest online practical trends also as Mentimeter etc. for enhancing interactive engagement with the students.

Response:

With the motto of Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, waste management has been one of the top agenda of the College for a clean and green campus. The College follows the principle of reduce, reuse and recycle. The College Management and Staff have taken significant initiatives for waste management. The College has Green Audit Committee which monitors solid waste, liquid waste, e-waste generated and sanitization on campus. A dedicated team of workers are responsible for maintaining cleanliness on campus.

Solid waste management

Waste generated through routine activity in the College that includes paper, plastics, glass, metals, foods, etc. is segregated on the basis of biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste. Blue and Green dustbins (pedal-pushed) are placed in the premises. Blue colored dustbins are kept for dry waste collection while green dustbin for green waste at every class room of the college. Composting facility is available for managing biodegradable/horticulture waste. Vegetable solid waste generated from college canteen and Mess kitchen handover to Nagar Nigam Van on regular basis. Various awareness campaigns such as Swachh Bharat, Clean and Green activities, and plantation program organized under NSS Unit.

The College also manages plant waste by utilizing for preparation of Bioplastics under the project funded by Science and Engineering Research Board, Department of Science and Technology, Govt. of India, New Delhi.

Liquid waste management

Liquid waste generated from different Departments of the College passed through primary sewage treatment plant installed in the college premises. The treated sewage reused in the Garden area for watering the plants.

Biomedical waste management

Biomedical waste generated from Biosciences laboratory and Life Science Laboratory. Sharps items e.g. needles, scalpel, blades, slides, cover slips etc. contaminated with biological waste items are deactivated by autoclaving. Students discard these items in the red container that is leak-proof and labeled with the biohazard symbol.

Microbiological culture media are handled by trained personnel only. After segregation, culture medium is safely sterilized by autoclaving at 121°C for 30 minutes. After autoclaving, media disposed of through normal waste disposal procedures.

All biological waste supply to Nagar Nigam Van after sterilization.

E-waste management

E waste including wide range electronics, computer, electrical such as printer, CD, DVD, Key Board, Mouse manage by their optimum use. The College takes efforts to minimize e –waste by repairing them. The non-working instruments, computer, printer, key boards, mouse, batteries etc. consider as scrap items on recommendation of e waste management committee. E-waste is generated in minimal amount in the college and the same is given to registered vendors, with an undertaking that the same will be processed or recycled in an environmentally sound manner as per the Government of India guidelines.

Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste

Agarose gel containing low concentration Ethidium Bromide collected in separate poly bag and disposed in red container. Hazardous waste generated from Chemical Sciences laboratory disposed in the black bin.

The motto of this camp is to perform basic health related tests for students, faculties, office staff and also for Class III and Class IV staff members of the college and provide guidance by doctors and nutritionist regarding better health. As most people are ignorant when it comes about routine health check-up; therefore the aim of organizing this camp is to make them aware about healthy lifestyle. Majority of the students studying in the college come from far off places and have to live in hostels, where they are unable to get proper meals. This camp helps them in knowing about their basic health parameters which makes them conscious about eating habits and they learn the importance of being fit and healthy.

1. The Practice

- The entire college faculty members contribute in the event by active participation through planning and execution of the event.
- Post graduate students of Biotechnology and Microbiology and undergraduate students of Department of Biosciences of the college are distributed in teams according to the planned events.
- The camp is conducted on 29th August of every year in the college campus for the entire college family.
- All the students and staff members of the college participate in various activities during the day like

Zumba, Skipping and Push-Up Competition, Health Check-Up, Healthy Food Stall Competition, Health Related Counselling from experts like Dietitian and Dentist, Blood Donation etc.

- The various health related activities motivate the students and staff members to adapt healthy lifestyle and stay healthy and fit.

1. Evidence of Success

- Active participation of students of the college.
